E_{xcel} in the topic of study to enrich learning experiences for your students, providing for deep and thoughtful inquiry discoveries. Use your knowledge to model a genuine enthusiasm about the topic.

N_{arrow} the topic of study so your students can relate to the subject, discover relevancy in their learning, and benefit from valuable learning objectives.

G_{uide} as a facilitator and let students determine their learning path as they develop their own questions and discover unknowns.

A_{dapt} your lessons by identifying topic gaps and areas of interest, as well as modifying instruction and assessment so standards are being addressed and everyone involved has the opportunity to succeed.

G_{ather} as many valuable resources as possible for your students, and evidence of student learning with the use of summative and formative assessments.

E_{xpand} your topic of study outside classroom doors: in nature, on field trips, online, and at home with purposeful, interest-filled activities.
